

Fire/EMS Report:

City of New Carlisle City Council Meeting 04-17-2023 Fire-EMS Report

- In the Month of March the New Carlisle Fire Division responded to 117 EMS call in the city and 10 in Elizabeth Township.
- The Division responded to 8 Fire related calls in the city and 4 in Elizabeth Township.
- We had 4 EMS calls answered by mutual aid, either by Pike Township or Bethel Clark, due to medic 52 being on a response.
- We answered 4 mutual aid EMS calls for Pike Township and 4 for Bethel Clark.



Trusty read a report from 10/22 where they were called for mutual aid. Due to the care from all crews, the patient (72, thrown from a horse) is home and doing well. Careflight felt that the crews involved were warranted to be nominated for the Ohio EMS Star Life Award. The crew will receive the award in Columbus.

Grimm asked about the incident at Dayview- Trusty noted a small fire from a faulty light fixture. The sprinkler system was activated as it should have been. No injuries.

Rodewald asked what happened at the BMV- Trusty noted a gas leak, high level.

Lindsey- Asks how many leaks. Trusty notes two leaks in the last six months. Trusty adds multiple tenant buildings and multiple gas lines. Lindsey notes faulty equipment. Lindsey congratulates the department, the chief, and the crew for their award.

Lowrey echoes the same thing, adds a big thank you, and they have done a wonderful job.

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Bridge agrees, adds they are a key part of the team, and values the leadership from Chief Trusty.

Public Works Departments:

- City wide tree trimming has started and will be ongoing through the winter.
- Dura-patching: Summer blend of emulsion should be available around April 17th, at which time ٠ the street crew will be out performing street and pothole repairs.
- Street light proposal signed 1/6 to install cobra light at Smith Park Shelter House. AES approved the installation. Materials on order. •
- Street Sweeper proposals, discussed at 3/20 council meeting. Further discussion to come. Scheduling demos of various machines.

Water Department:

- Private well inspection to start April 1st.
- Well #1 is currently being cleaned by a contractor.
- 2 hydrants replaced with more replacements to begin within the next couple of weeks. Delayed due to vac-truck out of service for a short time.
- Pool Operations: Water crew started the week of 4/3, dewinterizing and preparing the pool for the 2023 season.

Sewer Department:

- Secondary Clarifier #1 and Primary Clarifier #2: Contract awarded to Peterson Construction. Estimated \$286,500 in American Rescue Plan funds and \$98,500 OPWC funds.
- Plant Expansion Study: Ordinance in front of council for approval. Study to be completed in 3-6 months. Study will be utilized for future development needs.

2022 Road Reconstruction/Resurfacing Projects:

- Clark County Resurface Project: Suspended until 2023 Curb and ADA ramp work this late winter/Spring, prior to resurfacing in 2023. Survey work complete. Engineering is underway
- Fenwick Dr. Reconstruction Phase II: Engineering complete and bidding to be around April. Construction Cost is estimated to be \$452,792, with the city's share to be an estimate \$60,000 (share + Engineering).

Carlisle Park Phase 1 upgrade Project:

The City of New Carlisle has been awarded a CDBG grant. Project to remove the existing basketball court and replace it with a new full-size court. A new ADA accessible swing was added to the existing Swing-set. Future phases are to add a parking lot and new ADA accessible sidewalk with picnic tables connecting the open shelter and playset. Estimated Cost of \$80,000 with the city's estimated share to be \$20,000. Agreement has been signed and Survey should be complete any time now.

NatureWorks Grant:

The City of New Carlisle has been awarded the ODNR NatureWorks grant. Project to add 3 open shelters and replace concrete pad at the city pool. The grant will reimburse 75% of the construction cost. Agreement signed, moving on to the next steps in completing this project.

Lindsey- when will potholes get started? Kitko notes they have a list and will start any day.

Lowrey- paving Main? Kitko notes were done before the Heritage of Flight Festival. Kitko noted some of the areas.





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
Bridge notes digital promotion for health levy/fire levy. Trusty notes 4/30 @ noon at the station, the department will host an open house. Will hand out Arrow Queen ice cream donuts and grill hot dogs.

Bridge reads the trash renewal figures below. Lowrey asks if putting this out to bid is a gamble. Bridge notes yes, and last time the rates ended higher due to being put back to bid. Cook suggests going out to bid. Lindsey agrees and would like it to go out for bid. Bridge notes they said it last time, and they were not. Lindsey notes, "if by chance," we can get it cheaper. He adds how people are not very happy with Waste Management. Rodewald reminds everyone WM agreed to go to weekly recycling and did not raise rates. Rodewald notes we may have a little conflict of interest when going for a bid. Lowrey tries to focus on the increase of senior citizens. Cook suggests Waste Management percentage for seniors.

Discussion on the Hensley Park Sign that fell over. Lowrey suggests leaving it down. Lowrey asks about the Smith Park Sign. Bridge notes it will be cleaned up, and signage will be updated over the next few years, along with park signs following. Bridge is getting quotes for reader board signs. Eggleston suggests putting the Founded in 1810 sign. Cook adds he would like to see the sign to go back up and to ask TLS shop class for rehab. Bridge will check with the schools. Bridge agrees, honoring what that park was about, honoring Sheriff Hensley.







Kitko will keep the Council up to date with the project.

Lindsey motions for Eggleston to be the Petitioner with a 2nd by Cook. YES 6 Lindsey, Rodewald, Lowrey, Grimm, Bahun, Cook NAY: 0 Abstain 1 Eggleston -Lindsey notes she needs to give a reason for abstaining; she can vote, and abstaining is not necessary. Lowrey adds Councilwoman Eggleston can abstain if she chooses. Eggleton chose to abstain due to being nominated and not voting for herself. Accepted 6-0-1

8. Comments from Members of the Public:

John Krabacher- 307 N. Henry- comments on the trash can ordinance. On his way to Arrow Queen, he counted over 20 cans out or in the street on Saturday. He noted multiple pieces of furniture needing to be properly wrapped up for pickup. He adds he leaves his can next to the garage near the house. His lid broke and was told to place it by the road to be fixed. Took two weeks to get fixed. He suggests having it up by the house with the 24/48 hr time span. Notes Garden has new plots and raised beds accessible by many and up for rental. Asks if the items from Madison will come to the new garden site. Bridge notes they will help move but need help to deconstruct the items. Adds a touch base with Kitko and Bridge to coordinate things. Bridge thanks everyone involved with the garden. Krabacher notes a kudos to the "young deputy" who helped find the wallet of an older citizen and offered to take her to church.

Janelle Zimmerman- 219 Prentice Dr- would be wonderful to take the trail to Park Layne. She comments on the state of the sidewalks in New Carlisle. Some areas could be more evenly when she walks, and a crosswalk on Funston across Main St. would be helpful. Thanks, Mr. Agresta, for the presentation. Lowrey asks about those trees that cause the buckling of the sidewalk. Kitko notes it is the homeowner's responsibility to repair sidewalks and maintain and trim trees. Kitko adds they have looked at mid crosswalks, lots of in and out traffic by Funston and Main.

Charlotte Farley- 1204 Hemlock Way- she likes Waste Management and likes how they recycle. She has an issue with the minutes she reads online and suggests using the same Times New







LEASE AGREEMENT

The CITY OF NEW CARLISLE, OHIO, hereinafter referred to as "CITY" and/or "Lessor", in consideration of the covenants herein, does hereby grant, demise, let and lease unto the NEW CARLISLE BASEBALL/SOFTBALL ASSOCIATION, INC., an Ohio non-profit corporation, hereinafter referred to as "ASSOCIATION" and/or "Lessee", a strip of land that is approximately six hundred (600) feet off the North end of the Waterworks property of the City of New Carlisle, Ohio and which is commonly known as Haddix Field ("leased premises").

TO HAVE AND TO HOLD the same with all appurtenances thereunto belonging to said ASSOCIATION for and during the period of time commencing on the 1st day of January through the 31st day of December of each year for the years 2023, 2024 and 2025, subject to each parties' rights to early termination herein. The annual rent, in the amount of One Dollar (\$1.00), is to be paid by the ASSOCIATION to the CITY by January 1st of each lease year. The ASSOCIATION may prepay the annual rent for any of the lease years. Prepaid rent for any lease year subsequent to early termination of this lease shall be returned to the ASSOCIATION. The parties acknowledge that the annual rent for 2023 has already been paid as of the effective date of this agreement.

In the event the ASSOCIATION remains in possession of the leased premises after the expiration of the term of this lease and without execution of a new lease, it shall be deemed to be occupying the leased premises as a month-to-month tenant, subject to all provisions of this lease in so far as the same are applicable to a month-to-month tenancy.

As further consideration, the parties agree:

- 1. The ASSOCIATION shall maintain upon the leased premises suitable facilities for the encouragement and playing of baseball and softball in conformity with the purposes for which the ASSOCIATION was organized, subject to approval by the CITY.
- 2. The ASSOCIATION shall not use or occupy the leased premises or permit the same to be used or occupied for any purpose other than for the sport of baseball/softball and/or related activities except as otherwise agreed to by the CITY.

- 3. This Lease may not be assigned, nor may said leased premises be subleased, without the prior written consent of the CITY.
- 4. The ASSOCIATION shall make no alterations or additions in or to said leased premises without the prior written consent of the CITY.
- 5. The CITY shall maintain, during the term of this Lease, the following property currently located at the leased premises: white garage, six cinder block dugouts, light poles and their attachments and accessories, the concession stand (specifically, the building only), cement bleachers, and flagpole. The ASSOCIATION shall be responsible for all other maintenance at the leased premises including, but not limited to, maintaining a roadway suitable for ingress and egress by users thereof and all fences erected at the leased premises.
- 6. The CITY is offering the leased premises "as is" with no promises or guarantees of fitness for a particular purpose. The ASSOCIATION shall maintain the leased premises in a nuisance-free condition and be responsible for mowing all portions of the leased premises during the term of the lease.
- 7. The ASSOCIATION shall not use any fertilizer, pesticide, herbicide or any other chemical application at the leased premises without the prior written consent of the CITY, which likely will not be granted.
- 8. The ASSOCIATION shall do all things necessary to protect the leased premises and nearby municipal property from damage by all persons who enter upon the leased premises.
- 9. Each ASSOCIATION league participant shall sign a waiver of responsibility form, reviewed and approved by the City Law Director, which releases the CITY from all claims resulting from any and all injuries sustained while participating in ASSOCIATION sponsored activities. The ASSOCIATION shall maintain and keep on file the forms of all league participants who have not yet attained the age of twenty-one (21) years. A league participant's waiver of responsibility form must be signed prior to participation in ASSOCIATION events at the leased premises. Copies of such forms must be made available to the CITY promptly upon request. The ASSOCIATION shall be solely responsible for ensuring participant compliance under this paragraph.
- 10. The ASSOCIATION agrees to hold the CITY and the CITY'S officials, employees, agents and staff harmless from any and all liability arising out of ASSOCIATION activities at the leased premises.

- 11. The ASSOCIATION shall maintain in force and effect for the term of this Lease a policy of comprehensive general liability insurance in the minimum amount of Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) aggregate with the CITY designated as an additional named insured. The Policy shall cover liability for occurrences in or on the leased premises, including structures, parking areas, entranceways and injury to persons and/or property. The ASSOCIATION shall provide the City with a current Certificate of Insurance by January 1st of each year during the aforesaid term.
- 12. The ASSOCIATION shall surrender and deliver the leased premises at the end of said term in as good as or better condition as it existed at the beginning of the term, reasonable wear and tear and unavoidable casualty excepted.
- 13. The CITY shall be responsible for the ASSOCIATION'S electric utility expense for the leased premises, and shall add the leased premises to the CITY'S current IGS agreement, if permitted by IGS. The ASSOCIATION understands that the CITY does not warrant this service will be free from interruption. The ASSOCIATION acknowledges that this service may be suspended by reason of accident or repair, alteration, or improvement necessary to be made, or by operation of law, or causes beyond the control of the CITY. Any such interruption or discontinuance of services shall never be deemed to be an eviction or disturbance of the ASSOCIATION'S use and occupancy of the leased premises or any part thereof, render the CITY liable to the ASSOCIATION for damages, or relieve the ASSOCIATION from performance of its obligations under this Lease. In the event of any such interruption, the CITY shall take reasonable efforts to restore services as soon as reasonably possible.
- 14. It is expressly understood that the leased premises is located on the CITY'S water well fields. It could, therefore, be necessary for the CITY to require the ASSOCIATION to immediately vacate all or part of the leased premises. The CITY reserves the right, in its sole and absolute discretion, to require the ASSOCIATION to immediately vacate the leased premises notwithstanding any other provision of this lease to the contrary.
- 15. Either party, upon sixty (60) days prior written notice to the other party, may terminate this Lease for any reason. During any such sixty (60) day period, the ASSOCIATION shall have the right to remove any improvements such as fences, lights or buildings which it may have erected or installed thereon if those improvements will not be needed by the CITY for its future use of the leased premises. At the expiration of said sixty (60) day period, the CITY shall have the right to re-enter said leased premises for any purpose without resorting

to any further proceedings of any kind. The ASSOCIATION shall be entitled to the return of a pro-rata share of rent paid but shall have no other recourse or claim against the CITY by reason of early termination.

- 16. The effective date of this agreement is January 1, 2023.
- 17. The CITY reserves the right to place, maintain, repair or replace utility lines, pipes, tunneling and the like, on, under or over the leased premises as may be reasonably necessary or desirable, at the discretion of the CITY. The CITY shall have the right to enter onto the leased premises at all reasonable times.
- 18. The failure of either party to enforce any provision of these terms and conditions will not constitute a waiver of such provision nor diminish the right of either party to the remedies of such provision.
- 19. All personal property, equipment and inventory belonging to the ASSOCIATION, its agents, or its guests, located on or about the leased premises shall be at the sole risk of the ASSOCIATION, and the CITY shall not be liable for theft or misappropriation, or any damage or injury thereto.
- 20. This Lease contains the entire agreement between the parties, and any agreement hereafter or heretofore made shall not operate to change, modify, terminate or discharge this Lease, in whole or in part, unless such agreement is in writing and signed by each party to this Lease.
- 21. This Agreement shall be interpreted according to the laws of Ohio. If any portion of this Agreement is found to be void, unenforceable, or against public policy, the remaining portions of this Agreement shall not be affected, and each term and provision of this Agreement shall be valid and enforced to the fullest extent permitted by law.

ORDINANCE 2023-32

AN ORDINANCE EXTENDING THE FRANCHISE FOR THE CURBSIDE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL OF RESIDENTIAL GARBAGE, REFUSE AND RECYCLABLES IN THE CITY OF NEW CARLISLE, OHIO

WHEREAS, the City has established specifications regarding the collection and disposal of the garbage, refuse and recyclables of its residents; and

WHEREAS, on September 8, 2020, City Council approved a 3-year contract with Waste Management for the collection and disposal of residential garbage, refuse and recyclables; and

WHEREAS, on May 31, 2022, the City and Waste Management increased the collection costs and changed the frequency of recyclable collection from bi-weekly to weekly through an amendment to the contract; and

WHEREAS, the term of the contract is from December 2, 2020 to December 1, 2023 with an option for an extension of 2 years at rates mutually agreed upon by the parties; and

WHEREAS, the City may exercise its option by notifying Waste Management of the City's intention to do so at least 60 days in advance of the expiration of the current term of the contract; and

WHEREAS, Waste Management has submitted its proposed rates for the potential 2year extension; and

WHEREAS, subsection (c) of Section 4.13 of the Municipal Charter requires an ordinance in order to grant, renew or extend a franchise.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY OF NEW CARLISLE HEREBY ORDAINS, that:

- <u>Section 1</u>. The contract with Waste Management for the collection and disposal of residential garbage, refuse and recyclables, as amended, shall be extended for an additional two years at the rates indicated in Exhibit A.
- Section 2. The City Manager is hereby authorized and empowered to sign any and all documents necessary to extend the City's contract with Waste Management.

ORDINANCE 2023-33

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 1460.25 OF THE CODIFIED ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF NEW CARLISLE TO ADDRESS THE PLACEMENT OF RESIDENTIAL TRASH AND RECYCLING CONTAINERS

WHEREAS, Chapter 1460 of the Codified Ordinances of the City of New Carlisle sets forth the City's Exterior Property Maintenance Code; and

WHEREAS, Section 1460.25 specifically addresses the exterior conditions of residential properties; and

WHEREAS, it has been determined that Section 1460.25 should be amended to provide direction for the placement of trash and recycling containers.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY OF NEW CARLISLE HEREBY ORDAINS

that Section 1460.25 of the Codified Ordinances of New Carlisle be amended by adding Subsection (n) as follows:

1460.25 EXTERIOR PROPERTY AND STRUCTURE EXTERIORS; RESIDENTIAL.

(n) <u>Garbage, Refuse and Recycling Receptacles</u>. No garbage, refuse or recycling receptacle may be placed for collection more than 24 hours before collection, and any such receptacle must be removed no later than 24 hours after collection. When not placed for collection, all garbage, refuse and recycling receptacles must be stored within one (1) foot of the dwelling or an accessory structure located on the parcel, and entirely on an approved surface such as cement, asphalt, yard pavers or crushed limestone gravel.
