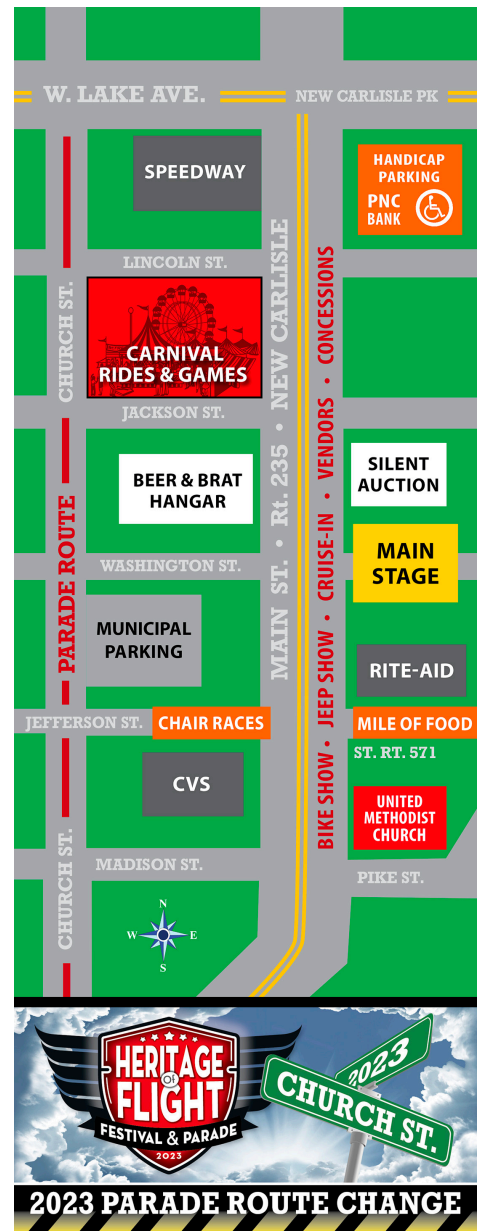
Warm Welcomes and a Bitter Sweet Goodbye Ahead


Beggar's Night: Saturday, October 28th from 6pm-8pm.

LEAF PICK-UP GUIDELINES - FALL 2023

The City will be providing street side leaf pick-up this October, November, and December. To participate in this free city service, please follow the guidelines listed below.

- Rake all leaves into the street two feet from the curb to allow for drainage.
- No foreign materials such as rocks, brush, branches, or garden materials. These materials may cause mechanical problems to the leaf machine.
- Avoid parking on the street during collection weeks. Cars parked on dry leaves may cause fires.
- Place leaves on the street one week prior to the scheduled pick-up date for your area.

There will be two collection dates. Please refer to www.newcarlisleohio.gov or the city's Facebook page to view the "Area of Town" map as it is too large for the Utility Bill Newsletter

(D) Southeast	Week of November 13th	Week of December 11th


Please note that the following alternatives are available for leaf disposal:

- Waste Management/Rumpke will pick-up leaves on your regular scheduled trash pick-up day. Leaves must be placed in your trash toter with your regular trash. Leaves placed in other containers, such as recycling, and/or bags placed outside of the toter will not be accepted.

Reduce Storm Water Runoff



Surfaces like driveways, sidewalks and streets prevent storm water runoff from naturally soaking into the ground.

The first inch of rainfall is responsible for the bulk of the pollutants in storm water runoff.



Storm water can pick up debris, chemicals and dirt.



one quart of oil

can pollute 250,000 gallons of drinking water.

Do not pour

used motor oil or liquid waste down floor drains, sinks or storm drains.



Rain barrels

collect and store storm water runoff from rooftops,



saving approximately 1,300 gallons of water during peak summer months.

A rain garden allows 30% more water to soak into the ground than a conventional lawn.

Use permeable pavers to reduce runoff, trap sediment and filter pollutants.
