

JOHN PAUL OF HONEY CREEK: A FRONTIER STORY THAT SHAPED NEW CARLISLE

If you've ever driven the rolling ground along Honey Creek and wondered who first dared to call this place home, the answer—at least in the county's earliest written histories—is John Paul. His family's story—part courage, part tragedy became one of the connecting links in the settlement era of what is now Clark County and the New Carlisle area.

A cabin on the hill

In the late 1780s, following the opening of the Northwest Territory, John Paul brought his family north from Kentucky, traveling up the Miami River valley with a small wagon, livestock, and tools. Drawn by the quality of the soil, water, and timber he had seen on an earlier scouting trip, Paul chose a low hill above a spring near present-day Twin Creeks along Honey Creek. There, he built a simple stockaded cabin—by most accounts one of the first cabins erected by

a Euro-American family within the county's future boundaries.

Like many frontier households, the Pauls cleared a garden patch, hunted, and kept constant watch. The region was a contested homeland for the Shawnee and other Indigenous nations, and violent encounters were tragically common in this period of displacement and war.

A family tragedy – and two survivors

Sometime around 1790, as preserved in local oral histories recorded decades later, Indigenous raiders descended on the Paul homestead while the family was at work near the cabin. In the chaos, several family members were brutally murdered. Accounts say that John Paul was mortally wounded, and only two of his children—a son, John Jr., and a daughter survived by fighting their way back into the cabin and holding off further assault. The exact location

and sequence have been debated by historians, but the episode became part of the area's early memory of the frontier years.

Rebuilding and roots that lasted

Out of that devastation came perseverance. John Paul Jr. remained on the land, farming the site, and years later, erecting the brick house that many residents will recognize from old photographs of the New Carlisle area. The home stood near the spot where the original cabin once rose above the spring.

John Paul (Sr.) is also remembered in church history as a founding voice in organizing the Honey Creek Presbyterian congregation, which is still standing on West Jefferson Street and was one of the area's earliest churches.

Why his story still matters

The Paul family's experience reflects a complicated chapter in our region: courageous settlement on the one hand; conflict, loss, and the displacement of Native peoples on the other. Today, we strive to tell this history with honesty and respect—for the settlers who built new lives here and for the Indigenous communities whose homelands and lifeways were profoundly affected.

Learning about John Paul offers more than a dramatic tale; it reminds us that Clark County's roots were planted by people who worked the soil, endured hardship, and created community—farms, homes, and churches—that helped shape New Carlisle. The grit and resilience of the early settlers has been a characteristic of the culture of New Carlisle for over 200 hundred years.

Editor's note: This article draws on early local histories and oral traditions that were written many years after the events described. Language and interpretations in those sources reflected their time. We share the story here with modern care and with respect for the Shawnee and other Indigenous peoples connected to this land.

HONORING LOWELL R. MCGLOTHIN — 2025 HERITAGE OF FLIGHT GRAND MARSHALL



COLDER WEATHER SAFETY TIPS

A Message from Chief Trusty New Carlisle Fire & EMS

As the weather cools and the holidays approach, it's a great time to check a few safety basics at home. Below are quick tips our department wants every household to keep in mind this fall.

October Safety Focus: Lithium-Ion Batteries at Home

BUY only listed products

- When purchasing devices that use lithiumion batteries, take a moment to research the brand and model.
- Look for a mark from a nationally recognized testing laboratory on the packaging and the product—this shows it meets established safety standards.

CHARGE devices safely

- Always use the charging cable and power adapter that came with the device (or a manufacturer-approved replacement).
- Follow the manufacturer's charging instructions and avoid placing devices on beds, couches, or under pillows while charging.

DISPOSE/RECYCLE responsibly

- Do not put lithium-ion batteries in the trash or regular curbside recycling—they can catch fire.
- Use a designated battery recycling program or drop-off site.

November Safety Tips

- Deep-frying a turkey? Fry outdoors and well away from buildings or anything that can burn, on a flat, stable surface.
- Make sure the turkey is completely thawed and dry before lowering it into hot oil.
- Use a timer and check food regularly unattended cooking is a leading cause of fires.

December Safety Tips

- Chimney & Fireplace: Have your chimney professionally cleaned at least annually before regular use.
- Furnace: Schedule a checkup and change filters per the manufacturer's recommendations.
- Alarms: Test smoke and carbon monoxide detectors and replace batteries if needed.
- Christmas Trees: If using a real tree, make sure it's fresh and water it daily. Keep trees away from heat sources such as fireplaces, radiators, or space heaters. Dispose of the tree promptly after the holiday season.
- Holiday Lights: Inspect lights each year for frayed wires, broken sockets, or loose connections. Only use lights that are UL-listed, and never overload outlets or extension cords. Always turn off holiday lights before leaving home or going to bed.

BUILDING A STRONGER COMMUNITY TOGETHER:

The City of New Carlisle Social Services Commission is committed to improving the well-being of all residents by promoting access to essential services, fostering community partnerships, and addressing the needs of our most vulnerable populations. Our mission is rooted in a simple belief: **everyone in our community deserves the opportunity to thrive.**

What We Do

The Social Services Commission works as a bridge between local government, nonprofit organizations, and residents to identify gaps in service and develop practical, compassionate solutions. Our areas of focus include:

- **Food Security:** Supporting local residents that are struggling with food security.
- Housing Support: Advocating for emergency housing assistance and resources for those facing homelessness or unsafe living conditions. Providing resources for residents that cannot physically or financially maintain their properties.
- Senior Outreach: Connecting older adults with services like transportation, home care, and social activities to reduce isolation.
- Youth & Family Services: Promoting programs that support youth development, childcare, mental health resources, and educational access.
- Crisis Response: Coordinating efforts during emergencies (such as extreme weather or utility disruptions) to ensure all residents are protected.

Recent Initiatives

- In August 2025, the City Council interviewed five applicants and approved the Social Services Commission through Ordinance 2025-31. The first organizational meeting will be held in October.
- In 2025 launched an initiative to gather volunteers from local organizations and churches to provide property maintenance for senior citizens, veterans and individuals with disabilities, and single parents that could not physically or financially maintain their properties.

Upcoming Ideas

- Launch a monthly Community Resource Fair, offering residents a one-stop shop for information on health care, employment, legal aid, and more.
- Secure funding for transportation vouchers for seniors and low-income families to access essential services.
- Expand outreach efforts through social media and community bulletin boards to ensure residents know where to turn for help.

How You Can Get Involved

We believe that lasting change happens when community members come together. You can support our work by:

- **Volunteering** with local service programs.
- Sharing resources or needs you see in your neighborhood.
- Attending meetings, held monthly at Heritage Hall Shelter House and open to the public.
- Offering feedback to help us better serve the city.


- Rake leaves into the street, 2 feet from the curb
